

**MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE
MAYOR AND COUNCIL
OF THE BOROUGH OF FRANKLIN
HELD AT THE FRANKLIN MUNICIPAL BUILDING
46 MAIN STREET, FRANKLIN, NJ
July 8, 2014**

Mayor Crowley called the meeting to order and requested the Borough Clerk to call the roll. Upon roll call, the following members of the Governing Body were present: Mr. Babcock, Mr. Giordano, Mr. Limon, Mr. Zschack, and Mayor Crowley.

Absent: Mr. Fanale, Mr. Snyder

Mayor Crowley led the assembly in the flag salute.

Mayor Crowley stated "This meeting is being held in compliance with the provisions of the Open Public Meetings Act, P.L. 1975, Ch. 231. It has been properly advertised and certified by the Clerk."

Mayor Crowley stated because there is a crowded house the Fire Marshall is in the back of the room and is responsible for keeping the isles clear. If he asks you to move please do so.

Mayor Crowley commented he is a very large opponent for free speech and the first amendment. Mayor Crowley commented on freedom of speech. Mayor Crowley stated the statements that were reported about his request and resignation from Councilman Fanale is accurately reported in the paper it is a personal statement of his. It is not a statement of the Mayor and Council. Mayor Crowley commented the Mayor and Council has no authority to remove an elected official for remarks they make or thoughts that they have. The only authority they have to remove an elected official is on certain conditions such as not coming to meetings things like that. There is no way for this Council to take any action against Mr. Fanale.

Mayor Crowley stated just because himself or different Council people have not come forward and made remarks, does not mean we support his remarks one way or the other. Silence by Council members does not mean they agree or disagree. The options for Mr. Fanale are if the voters that put him in office wish to recall him they can go to the County Board of Elections and find out the process and go through with that. If anyone feels he has broken the law they can take it to the prosecutor's office. If anyone feels he has made an ethics problem they can complain to the proper State Authorities. Mayor Crowley commented he will tell you the State Authorities cannot take action against people for their thoughts and what their thinking is. It is really up to the Franklin Voters if they care to do anything about it.

Mayor Crowley commented most people wish to discuss this in one form or another, he will go right into public comment; starting off with his statement, than asking the Council members if they want to say anything. At that point he will be opening to the public; as usual at our meetings the public comment is limited to three minutes, he is allotting one hour for public comment. When you come up to the microphone he asks to identify yourself for the record, speak into the microphone, be as brief as possible so not to be redundant and just repeat what other people have said. If at that time you wish to leave the meeting and go out the side door that will allow other people to come in and talk.

Mr. Babcock thanked Mayor Crowley for giving him this opportunity to say a few words. First he thanked Mr. Dabinett for a few words of wisdom. Mr. Babcock commented he wanted to clear the air on comments made May 22. Things were said in the heat of a moment, in regards to a serious family issue, he was not speaking as a Councilman he was speaking as a concerned son. He is not a COP hater, one of his best friends is a COP. Mr. Babcock explained his past record on police issues, you can clearly see he has no problem with the police, this one time he didn't vote in favor of a new police car, it was the same night we were voting to increase taxes in town. Mr. Babcock explained his concern for the economic times. Mr. Babcock was

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elected to this position by the people of Franklin; I will keep them in the best interest at all times. Mr. Babcock apologized for the night of May 22, things happen in the heat of the moment.

Mr. Zschack had no comment.

Mr. Giordano commented he had done an interview with NJ inside scene; he basically stated his position. The past few weeks have been very tough on him. He was an incumbent running for reelection with Mr. Fanale as his running mate. Mr. Giordano commented he has a brother who is in Afghanistan, his father is a Vietnam vet who passed away. Mr. Giordano commented he is appalled by the actions and the outright cowardness that he [Fanale] is not here after creating such an uproar. Mr. Giordano commented he is grateful that Mr. Babcock has taken responsibility, everybody makes mistakes, he would have hoped that Mr. Fanale would have been here to face [this]. Mr. Giordano commented it is a shame that the town of Franklin is known as a place where COP haters are. Mr. Giordano commented he hopes he [Mr. Fanale] resigns; he actually suggests he [Fanale] resigns and if this Council can't censor him, he should face a recall in January of next year and he would be happy to be the first person to sign that recall sheet.

Mr. Limon commented he is 100 percent in support of you [Mayor] and what you said is the way he feels with everybody's freedom of speech. Mr. Limon commented after the last meeting when he ran the meeting in the Mayor's absence, he met with Mr. Fanale. Mr. Limon commented he said to him whatever he writes on Face book but be prepared that you have to handle the acceptance or in this case the none acceptance of what you write. Mr. Limon commented he [Fanale] was advised by him after the meeting, if he is going to resign, not to play games, resign.

OPEN PUBLIC SESSION

Mr. Babcock made a motion to open the meeting to the public for anyone wishing to address the Governing Body. Seconded by Mr. Limon. All were in favor.

Dick Durina, 23 Lozaw Road, Franklin, stepped forward. Mr. Durina showed a picture of the real Franklin, this distribution shows a State Trooper helping out two little children. It is entitled first impressions. Mr. Durina showed the audience a board of the Franklin High School Football teams and explained the team picture. Mr. Durina commented on first amendment rights. Mr. Durina commented shame on Mr. Fanale and shame on anyone else that supports that kind of thinking. Mr. Durina commented on his disappointment with the Mayor.

Nevin Mattessich, President of Police Lodge 57, Franklin Borough Police Officer, stepped forward. Mr. Mattessich commented he was shocked to find out how unprofessional, disrespectful and immature Dave Fanale's actions directed towards law enforcement community have been. Mr. Mattessich explained and commented on Face book postings by Mr. Fanale. Mr. Mattessich asked Mr. Mayor seek legal advice, conduct an independent investigation into Dave Fanale's actions take an initiative, don't sit by while the good employees and the good residents of Franklin suffer, take Franklin back.

Robert VanderPloeg III, Franklin Borough Police officer stepped forward. Mr. VanderPloeg III commented he is not a mobster, he is not a thug or a bully, he does not have low self esteem, he does not monopolize violence, he is not a criminal, he is not an over paid cry baby, he does not abuse or deceive the public, he is not a terrorist, he does not wear a government costume he wears a uniform. His uniform has his name and the name of his agency and the Borough he serves on it. Which he is proud of. Mr. VanderPloeg commented law enforcement is a business, it is a

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business of people. Mr. VanderPloeg commented on Mr. Fanale's Face book posts and Mr. Fanale behavior.

Josh Oliveri, Port Authority police Department, stepped forward. Members of the Port Authority Police Department also stepped forward and held up a banner. Mr. Oliveri commented 13 years ago after losing 37 police officers of its own on 911 on what was known as ground zero. Mr. Oliveri commented on the stress, strain and embarrassment brought on by Mr. Fanale. Mr. Fanale certainly has the right to say what he feels having that right by proxy doesn't make it right. Mr. Oliveri asked for Mr. Fanale to step down and be removed from his seat as Council. Mr. Oliveri read a certificate into the record.

Gil Tagliatela, President of the Sussex County Police Association, stepped forward. Mr. Tagliatela commented it has come to the attention of the Sussex County Police Association that Councilman Fanale has been posting several vulgar postings on his face book page. Mr. Talialatela commented on these Face book postings and effect on public safety.

Alison Littell McHose, 76 Buckwheat Road, Franklin stepped forward. Mrs. Littell is also Assemblywoman, an elected official who lives in town, home owner, tax payer, a wife of a soldier who is serving abroad in Afghanistan protecting our freedom. Mrs. McHose commented she is very troubled by Mr. Fanale's actions, she complimented Mayor Crowley and Councilman Giordano for publically calling for his resignation. Mrs. McHose gave history of her family in Franklin. Mrs. McHose commented despite the fact we have a first amendment there is a level of decorum for elected officials and there is a level of respect for other employee's and entities within your town. Mrs. McHose referred to her grandfather's run in with Chief Irons. Mrs. McHose commented tonight she stands publically and also calls for Dave Fanale to resign, as a republican I to feel embarrassed by his behavior.

William and Judy Bosworth, stepped forward representing themselves and all the families who are part of Garden State Survivors and Survivors of the Triangle. Both Organizations are Chapters of a National Organization concern of police survivors. We are a group joined together sharing the loss of their loved ones. Those who have made an ultimate sacrifice. Mr. Bosworth commented on the loss of his son in the line of duty and the disrespect for deceased with comments on Mr. Fanale's Face book page.

Phyllis Morgan, who's son was Michel Morgan Jr. from the Newark Police Department. Mrs. Morgan explained as a mother it was very difficult to see what she has seen on Face book. Mrs. Morgan commented he [Fanale] shouldn't be sitting on this Council and how children are affected by the loss of their mother or father, on how many husbands and wives are raising their children alone because an officer made the ultimate sacrifice. Mrs. Morgan commented Mr. Fanale is a coward not being here tonight and making this Council go through this and listen to everyone's remarks. Mrs. Morgan thanked the Council for letting her approach them tonight.

Harry Hennion, 139 Davis Road, Franklin, stepped forward. Mr. Hennion commented he is appalled by the actions of Mr. Fanale and was hoping he would be here tonight because he wanted to ask him if it was all true. Mr. Hennion commented he would make two suggestions for you as the Council, make a resolution requesting that he resigns as a Council. Mr. Hennion requested Mayor Crowley relieve him of all his Council duties; you may not relieve him as Councilman but you can take him off the committees.

Alan Purcell, with the Passaic County SPCA, stepped forward. Mr. Purcell commented he has two reasons being up here both for one man. First back in

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January when officer Burgos ran into a store to save animals lives in a fire; normally we don't get involved with another County but he thought it was best if we honor the officer. Mr. Purcell read a certificate he presented to Officer Burgos. Mr. Purcell commented he is retired as Councilman from Wayne Township; which is the second reason he is here. Mr. Purcell explained how he felt and did as a Councilman. Mr. Purcell commented he expected Mr. Fanale to come to the meeting and face his accusers. Mr. Purcell commented Mr. Fanale should do the honorable thing and resign but do you have any honor.

Mark Razzoli, Jersey City FOP Lodge #4, stepped forward. Mr. Razzoli commented he stands in this room tonight, he doesn't see any mobsters or any other name Mr. Fanale wants to call us. Mr. Razzoli spoke about public safety and postings of Mr. Fanale. Mr. Razzoli commented he hopes he [Mr. Fanale] resigns immediately. It is such a disgrace to the families who have lost men and women.

Sylvania Dureny, Rutherford Ave, Franklin, stepped forward. Mrs. Dureny commented to the Mayor she had spoke at the last town Council meeting. Unfortunately her family had a situation unexpected in Franklin Borough. Mrs. Dureny commented everything she felt for this town Fanale made her hate it the night he [Mr. Fanale] approached her home representing the Town Council. Mrs. Dureny explained to the Council the situation at her home with Mr. Fanale. Mrs. Dureny commented Mr. Fanale we want him to be recalled; he needs to leave and to leave now.

Dawn Fantasia, resident of Franklin a taxpayer and homeowner, stepped forward. Ms. Fantasia read statements from Mr. Fanale. Ms. Fantasia commented Mr. Fanale misrepresented himself to the voters he publically degraded law enforcement. He has brought shame to our town with little apology. Ms. Fantasia thanked the Council for listening to everyone today.

Timothy Ganavin, retired law enforcement officer. Mr. Ganavin read a speech on officers that gave their lives and unity. Mr. Ganavin requested a moment of silence for our fallen brother and sisters.

Katie Vanderwiele, Buckwheat Road, Franklin, stepped forward. Ms. Vanderwiele spoke about her late father who was a police officer for 30 years.

Mike Rathbun, 30 Sterling Street, Franklin, stepped forward. Mr. Rathbun commented on his family members that served as police officers. Mr. Rathbun commented he stepped forward this evening to tell him [Fanale] the Franklin community will no longer stand by and allow him to bring down and embarrass the community. We have come together tonight as one, stand side by side to take back our town. Mr. Rathbun urged Mr. Fanale to resign from his seat effective immediately. He has made inappropriate and offensive comments then says that he is protected by his first amendment rights. We the people of Franklin are asking you to step down or we petition for a recall. It is time for the Council to get back to business.

Anthony Marino, 45 Mabie Street, Franklin, stepped forward. Mr. Marion commented he has lived in this town since 1971 and has never seen anything like this; one thing this man used his position to create caos to disrupt town government to disrupt the goings and proceedings for this town.

Chuck McCann, Corkhill Road, Franklin, stepped forward. Mr. McCann commented when we are elected there is a certain decorum you need to follow you are a representative of the community. Mr. McCann read some quotations from Mr. Fanale.

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John Cholminski, 25 Foxhill Drive, Franklin, stepped forward. Mr. Cholminski commented he is a volunteer on Planning Board for over 20 years and is the chairman on that Board. Mr. Cholminski commented he came here tonight to thank you [Council], each of you for your support and particularly Mayor Crowley. Mr. Cholminski commented it has been very difficult for you [Mayor Crowley] he has asked for Mr. Fanale's resignation; there isn't much else he can do, he certainly doesn't deserve and negative press through this whole affair. Mr. Cholminski commented he wanted to thank you [the Council] for your support and your service to the community.

Floy Estes, 13 Taylor Road, Franklin, stepped forward. Mr. Estes thanked the Council for their services and has respect for what Mr. Giordano said. Mr. Estes thanked the Police Departments and Mayor and Council.

There being no one else present who wished to address the Governing Body, Mr. Limon made a motion to close the meeting to the public, seconded by Mr. Babcock. All were in favor.

Mayor Crowley thanked everyone for coming out tonight; in general everything has been said.

Mayor and Council took a break approximately 8:00PM.
The Mayor and Council reconvened approximately 8:10PM.

Mr. Kilduff reported some of the items from the following administrator report which is also on file in the Clerk's office.

Borough Sites and Street Issues

The Franklin Day/Nite festivities are scheduled for this Saturday, July 12th at the Franklin Pond Recreation area. The Recreation Commission has been working hard to prepare a wide range of activities and events to be conducted throughout the day and into the evening, culminating in a fireworks display around 9:30PM. The Borough is grateful to all Recreation volunteers for their efforts to make this day a fun filled event.

The Borough Administrator and Engineer met with the County Administrator and County Engineers on July 1st to discuss resurfacing of a portion of Junction Street as a quid pro quo for cancellation of the proposed secondary Susquehanna Street Bridge. During the meeting the County was persuaded to expand their limited project proposal to include milling and repaving of Fowler Street from Junction Street to the E-07 Bridge and to fund the missing sidewalk from the bridge extending 80 feet along Fowler Street. The additional resurfacing will provide all new pavement for Susquehanna Street residents making their way to the viaduct bridge along Junction and Fowler Streets.

A preconstruction meeting with Rockborn Trucking & Excavating, the low bidder for the Cork Hill Road resurfacing project was conducted on July 7th. The project is expected to begin on or about July 21st and will take about a week for completion. The road will be closed. Residents should plan other routes during this time frame. Due to the favorable bid received, it will be possible to accomplish approximately 500 additional paving along Cork Hill road. The base project includes milling of portions of the roadway and resurfacing of approximately 5,120lf.

Financial Control/Legal Issues

The Borough's insurance company has provided notice to the Borough regarding possible limitations of coverage in a recent civil rights action, (David & Lillian Reade v. Nevin Mattessich, et al). The carrier advises punitive damages will not be covered if the carrier is prohibited by the State from indemnifying defendants. The plaintiffs are seeking compensatory, statutory and punitive damages along with fees and costs.

A response has been provided to the F.O.P. grievance for placing police officers employment status change on the Council's agenda. The Borough holds the grievance was premature and without merit as the two patrolmen have already been promoted. The F.O.P. has rejected the Borough's position moving the grievance to Step 4. A hearing will be conducted at the next regular Council meeting.

The elevator maintenance renewal letter is on the consent agenda. The vendor, Morris County Elevator, is holding to last year's contract with no changes or increase in cost to the Borough.

Operational/Personnel Matters

Patrolman Robert Vander Ploeg has completed his probationary employment and has been promoted to permanent employment status. Commensurate with this change is a Step increase on the salary guide from Starting Step (\$42,980) to Step 1 (\$51, 564). Patrolman Jesse Babcock has been promoted from

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Step 2 (\$58,418) to Step 3 (\$65,184) on the salary guide. We congratulate both these officers on their recent promotions.

Chief McInerney has advised the Administrator of his intentions to assign Officer Vander Ploeg to a newly created detective position. This personnel change will involve cost to the Borough and is under review.

Police Officer interviews are underway. The committee hopes to complete its work before the August meeting.

Land Use Matters

Ordinance #7-2014, pertaining to commercial and recreational vehicles in residential zones is on tonight's agenda for introduction with a public hearing to be held at the August Council meeting. Per municipal land use law, the Planning Board will review the ordinance at its July 21st meeting.

Rt. 23 sidewalk improvements have been installed for the new Auto Zone/STS stores. Building construction is expected to commence next week.

Long-term and Capital Projects

A resolution authorizing issuance of approximately \$2.6 million in bond anticipation notes is on the agenda. The amount includes the total of new debt authorized for the Borough's road resurfacing program and refinancing of old debt. Combining these separate obligations into one bond represents a saving to the Borough in soft costs associated with bond anticipation notes.

Miscellaneous

Residents are reminded the Sussex County Municipal Utilities Authority Electronic waste event is scheduled for Saturday, July 26th from 7AM to 2PM at the SCMUA facility on Route 94 in Lafayette.
