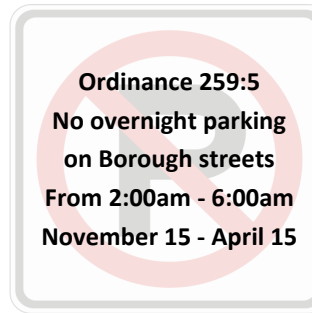

NJ Statutes define the Municipal Clerk's responsibilities as:

Secretary to the Governing Body, Secretary to the Municipal Corporation, Administrative and Licensing Officer, Election Administrator and Registrar of Voters and Custodian of Records.

As Secretary to the Governing Body the Clerk attends all Council meetings, prepares minutes, maintains ordinances and resolutions. As Custodian of records, the Clerk is responsible for all OPRA requests. Duties as election official involve handling voter registrations, candidate petitions for Mayor, open Common Council seats and petitions for Party Committee Seats.

How to Obtain a certified copy of a Vital Record, such as a Birth, Death, or Marriage Certificate:

In accordance with the Governor's Executive Order #18, only the following persons are entitled to a certified copy of a vital record: Subject, Subject's Parents, Legal Guardians, or Legal Representative, Spouse, Child, Grandchild or Sibling, if of legal age.

Marriage/Re-marriage/Civil Union/Domestic Partnership Licenses



Please call 973-827-9280 ext. 100 or 101 to schedule an appointment to complete a Marriage License Application. The State requires a 72 hour waiting period from the date of application before the license is issued. No license is to be issued prior to the 72 hours unless ordered to do so via an appropriate Court Order. A license is valid for 30 days from the date issued.

Applicants should follow these rules when applying for a License:

The Marriage license application is to be made in the New Jersey Municipality in which either party resides. The license is valid throughout the State of New Jersey only.

If neither applicant is a New Jersey resident, submit the application in the municipality where the event will be taking place. The license is then only valid in the municipality where the license is issued.

The cost of the license is \$28.00, cash, money order or check made payable to Franklin Borough and is required at the time you apply.

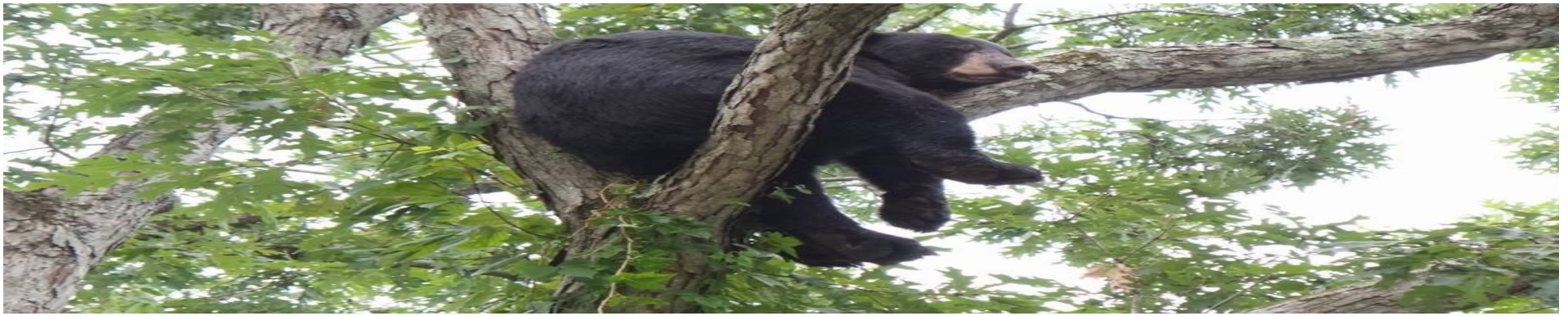

Get the Bear Facts

REMEMBER: Never feed bears!! It's illegal in New Jersey, and it's dangerous.

DID YOU KNOW?

- ◆ Black bears are usually solitary animals that are most active at dawn and dusk.
- ◆ Black bears have excellent senses of smell and hearing.
- ◆ Black bears can run up to 35 miles per hour. They are strong swimmers and excellent climbers. Both adults and cubs will climb trees for food and to escape disturbances.
- ◆ Black bears eat both plants and animals. Their diet mostly consists of skunk cabbage, berries, wild cherries, acorns and beechnuts. They also eat insects, small mammals and dead animals.
- ◆ Black bears are opportunistic feeders and will supplement their diet with food or garbage left out by people.
- ◆ Adult females average 175 pounds; adult males average 400 pounds.
- ◆ Not all black bears are black. They can be brown, cinnamon, blonde white and even gray-blue. Fifteen percent of NJ's bears have a white chest blaze.
- ◆ During winter, black bears undergo a period of dormancy in dens, called torpor, to avoid severe weather and food shortages. Since black bears are not true hibernators, they may leave their dens if disturbed or to search for food on mild winter days.
- ◆ Den sites include rock cavities, brush piles, open ground nests and hollow trees. Bears do not eat, drink, urinate or defecate while in dens, but females can give birth and nurse their young.
- ◆ Breeding season runs from late May until August, peaking in June and July. Cubs are born in January and weigh about 8 ounces to 16 ounces. The average litter size is three. Cubs remain with the female until she breeds again 16 months to 18 months later.











TIPS FOR HOMEOWNERS

- ◆ Use certified bear-resistant garbage containers if you live in an area frequented by black bears. They offer the best protection. Otherwise, store all garbage in containers with tight-fitting lids and place them along the inside walls of your garage or in the basement, a sturdy shed or other secure area.
- ◆ Wash garbage containers with a disinfectant solution regularly to remove odors.
- ◆ Put out garbage on collection day, not the night before.
- ◆ Clean up after pets. If you feed them outside, do so during daylight hours only.
- ◆ Pick up any leftover food and remove bowls immediately after they have finished.
- ◆ Clean outdoor grills and utensils thoroughly after each use and store grills securely. Grease and food residue attract bears.
- ◆ Do not place meat or any sweet foods in compost piles.
- ◆ Avoid feeding birds if you live in an area frequented by black bears. Birdseed attracts bears. If you choose to feed birds, do so during daylight hours only between December 1 and April 1, when bears are least active. Suspend feeder from a free-hanging wire, making sure the bottom is at least 10 feet off the ground. Bring feeder indoors at night. Clean up spilled seeds and shells.
- ◆ Pick up any fruit or nuts that fall from trees and discard it in garbage containers with tight-fitting lids.
- ◆ Consider installing electric fencing to protect crops, beehives, livestock and compost piles if you live in an area frequented by black bears.

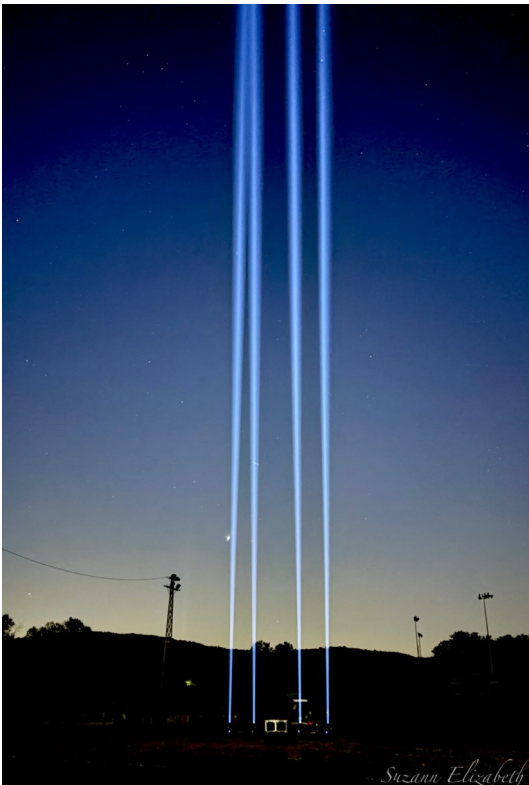
We would like to personally thank all the sponsors and volunteers that help make these events possible.

To report a streetlight outage:

- ♦ Call JCP&L's automated outage reporting line at 1-888-LIGHTSS (888-544-4877). For faster service, use the phone number associated with your account and say "streetlight problem" after the greeting.
- ♦ Visit www.firstenergycorp.com and select your electric company. Under Outages, click on "Report Streetlight Problems."
- ♦ Call Franklin Borough Clerk's office at 973-827-9280.

When you contact either JCP&L or Franklin Borough, just let them/us know the following:

- ♦ Your name and phone number, in case we need more information.
- ♦ Address where the streetlight is located - nearest house or business address and the nearest cross street.
- ♦ The number on the pole.
- ♦ What is wrong with the streetlight - for example, damaged pole, light fixture is broken, the light is on during the day, the light flickers or is out completely.

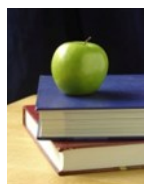

Flu Basics

What Is The Flu? The flu, the common name for influenza, is a highly contagious respiratory disease caused by influenza viruses.

What Are The Symptoms Of The Flu? Fever, Cough, Sore Throat, Body Aches, Headache.

Who Gets The Flu? Anyone can get the flu. On average, in the United States, 5% to 20% of the population gets the flu each year.

When Does The Flu Occur? Flu season in the United States is usually in the fall and winter months. The peak of flu season is between October and April.

How Does The Flu Spread? The flu virus spreads through droplets that enter the air after people cough and sneeze. Others can breathe them in or get them on their hands and become infected when they touch their eyes, nose or mouth

When Are People Contagious? People can spread the flu up to 24 hours before they feel sick and for about a week after symptoms begin. That time may be longer for children.

How Soon Do Flu Symptoms Start? Symptoms usually start 1 to 3 days after the flu virus enters the body.

How Long Do Symptoms Last? People are usually sick for about one week.

How Can The Flu Be Prevented? Get the flu vaccine. Cover coughs and sneezes. Wash hands frequently. Avoid sick people. Clean commonly shared or frequently touched items.

When Should I Get The Flu Vaccine? You should get vaccinated as soon as vaccine is available (ideally by October-November) and as long as flu is present in the community.

Do I Have To Get Vaccinated Every Year? Yes. The seasonal flu virus is always changing, so you need to get a new vaccine each year.

After I Get Vaccinated Am I Protected Right Away? No. It takes about two weeks for your body to be protected.

What Should I Do If I Get The Flu? Drink plenty of liquids. Get plenty of rest. Stay home from work or school. Call your healthcare provider.

YOUR HOME'S FIRE PREVENTION PLAN



PLAN AHEAD If a fire breaks out in your home, you may have only a few minutes to get out safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Everyone needs to know what to do and where to go if there is a fire.

Safety Tips:

Draw a home escape plan and discuss it with everyone in your household.

Practice the plan night and day with everyone in your home twice a year.

Know at least two ways out of every room, if possible. Make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily.

Have a meeting place (like a tree, light pole or mailbox) a safe distance from the home where everyone should meet.

Push the smoke alarm button to start the practice drill.

Get out Fast practice using different ways out.

Teach children to escape on their own in case you can't help them.

Close doors behind you as you leave.

Go to your outside meeting place. Get out and stay out. Never go back inside for people or pets.

Use your second way out in the case of an actual fire if smoke is blocking your door or the first way out.

Get low and go under the smoke to get out safely if you have to escape through smoke.

Feel the door and knob before opening the door. If they are hot use the second way out.

Consider getting escape ladders listed by a recognized testing laboratory for escaping from second and third floor windows if all other exits are blocked.













Make sure the ladder fits the window.

To Avoid injury, only use the ladder in a real emergency.

Holiday Lighting Safety Reminder Tips

The holiday season is the most popular time for home decorations. Here are some tips for your holiday lighting displays to help you and your family remain safe throughout the season.

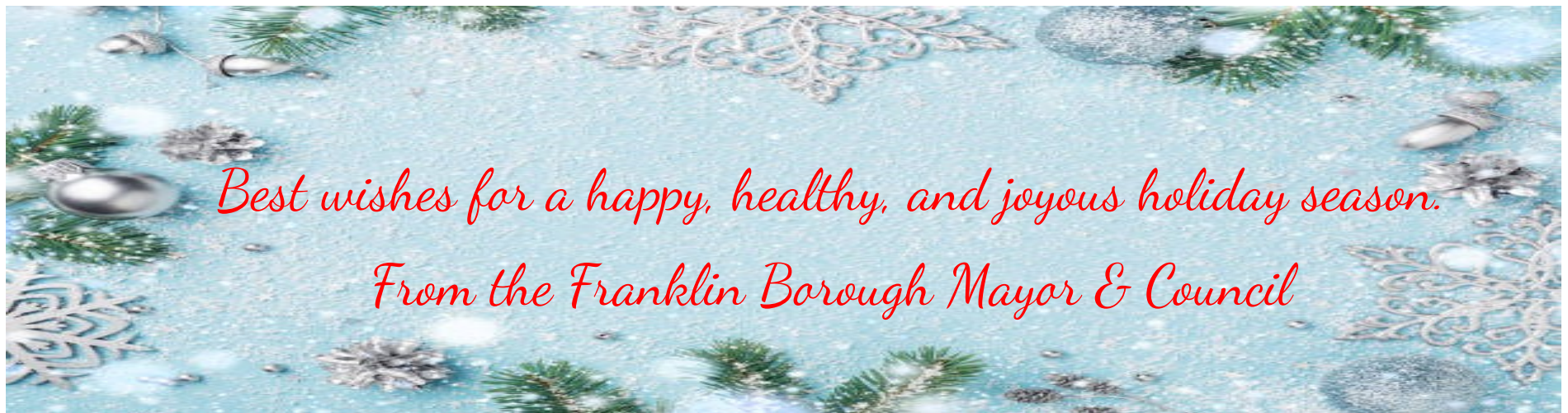
Outdoor Lighting Safety

- * Check all lights for frayed wires or areas where insulation has pulled away from plugs or sockets. Discard and replace any damaged light strings.
- * Take extra care using a ladder to install lights-avoid contact with overhead wires and make sure the ladder is placed on solid, level ground that isn't slippery.
- * Ensure that tacks or nails used to hold light strings do not pierce any insulation on wires or light sockets.
- * Use only extension cords that are approved for outdoor use. These cords must meet rigorous safety standards that indoor cords may not meet.
- * Outdoor lights, inflatables and other decorations should be plugged into outlets protected by ground fault interrupters.
- * Place outdoor lights on a timer or turn them off before you go to bed.

Indoor Lighting Safety

- * Inspect all light strings and cords for any damage, including frayed wires or insulation that has pulled away from light sockets or plugs. Also check for chewing or scratching damage if you have pets in the house. Discard and replace any damaged light strings.
- * Live trees should be kept well watered.
- * No more than three strings of standard indoor lights should be connected to any extension cord.
- * Make sure cords are placed where they won't be stepped on, kinked or pose a tripping hazard.
- * Lights should not be permitted to touch drapes, furniture or carpeting.
- * Lights should be turned off overnight and when no one is home.

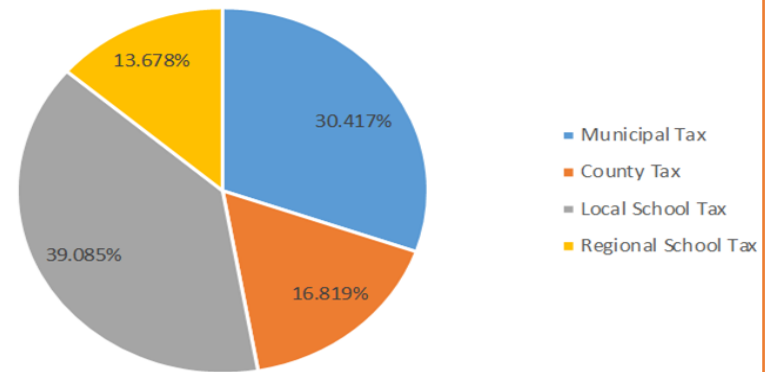

SOLID WASTE & RECYCLING INFORMATION

Solid Waste Trash/Garbage pickup is collected **every Tuesday** and should be placed at curbside no later than 6:30 am.

Each taxpayer is entitled to 3 (three) 32 gallon trash containers collected each week.

Blue Diamond may or may not observe all holidays, when in doubt, please put your trash/recyclables out for the scheduled day!

COLLECTION WILL TAKE PLACE ON THE NEXT DAY IF A HOLIDAY IMPACTS PICK-UP

RECYCLING

Single stream (comingled) recycling pickup is collected **every other Wednesday** and is available for all residential dwellings regularly serviced by Blue Diamond and materials must be placed at the curb by 6:30 am.

Residents may place their comingled newsprint, junk mail, brown paper bags, office grade printing paper, shredded paper and magazines together with other recyclable material in a single container marked "RECYCLABLE". (Stickers are available at Borough Hall).

Paper newsprint, magazines and cardboard placed curbside must be cross tied and bundled to a height no higher than 12 inches.

Corrugated cardboard & chipboard placed curbside must be flattened and tied. Comingled materials consisting of three colors of glass, Tin, Aluminum, & Plastic Containers (#1 through #7) must be placed curbside in the reusable "Recycling" Container.

Items left in plastic or paper bags will not be picked up.

VEGETATIVE WASTE COLLECTION - picked up by Blue Diamond

During the months of April through October, grass, leaves and branches will be picked up on the **"FOURTH THURSDAY OF EACH MONTH."** FINAL PICK-UP IS MONDAY, NOVEMBER 30, 2026.

PLACE AT CURBSIDE NO LATER THAN 6:30 AM

Brush and branches shall be bundled and tied together and shall not contain pieces greater than 4 feet.

Leaf, grass and vegetative yard waste should be bagged using ***ONLY* BIODEGRADABLE PAPER BAGS**, or be placed in re-usable containers, non-biodegradable bags **WILL NOT** be picked up!!

BULK PICKUP - HOUSEHOLD ITEMS ONLY - AND MAY NOT EXCEED 3 (THREE) CUBIC YARDS PER RESIDENCE

Items such as furniture type garbage will be picked up on regular garbage days.

Please contact: Blue Diamond @ 973-598-9800 the day prior to your regular pickup to inform them you will be placing a bulk item at curbside.

For white goods/metal, e.g., stoves, refrigerators and appliances **please call: BLUE DIAMOND 973-598-9800**

Important Bulk Pick-up Changes!!

The following items may no longer be placed curbside for bulk pick-up:

Televisions - Monitors, - Computers - Portable/Laptop Computers
